## Researching and Writing History

The root word of history is the Greek word "historia," meaning inquiry; a systematic investigation into a subject by asking questions, finding clues and providing thoughtful and well-reasoned analysis and interpretation.

Historical analysis involves examining evidence carefully and breaking it into its component parts including: change over time; comparing and contrasting, discovering relationships; identifying motives; recognizing bias and underlying assumptions; making inferences and finding evidence to support generalizations. Sometimes this analysis provokes contradiction or controversy, but it is critical that the writers and readers of history be willing to listen to another's viewpoint.

Too many readers and writers think of the word history in terms of "his" story or "her" story and their writing reflects this "story" approach to history in which there is no critical thinking, no analysis and no historical context.

The goal of this Arizona Women's History Symposium is to acquaint you with the current state of Arizona women's history, help identify assumptions about women's roles, the importance of placing women in historical context and to stimulate thinking about the research, writing and interpretation of women's history.
